After a number of years of looking for 'the right pub, in the right location with the right atmosphere and friendly locals', we finally found our ideal place, right back in the village where our family roots originated; finally no passports are needed to get from the vales of Wiveliscombe to the Hills of Exmoor.

As many of you know Eric was born and raised at Gupworthy Farm, Wheddon Cross and farmed at Higher Eastcott for many years. He subsequently turned his hand to a number of different ventures from house renovation, landscape gardening, and Barman for a number of local pubs, but his heart was always set on owning and running a Pub of his own. Julie works for the Exmoor National Park Authority and has done for the last 15 years, she will continue to do so and help support Eric in the Pub. As Julie initially trained for the Catering industry at Exeter College her skills in the kitchen are often called upon especially for some of the delicious dishes on the specials board.

Caroline our eldest daughter has decided to join the family business in January to assist Eric in the running of this thriving and popular Exmoor Inn. Following her 4 year Business Studies course she went travelling in New Zealand and then worked for the Met Office in Exeter as a college administrator, she now leaves her job in the Finance Department for Debenhams Head Office. Using her experiences from these jobs and working at Raleghs Cross and latterly for the Valiant Soldier, Caroline enjoys combining office work with the social interaction gained from working in a pub so what better way than to help her parents in their new venture. Francesca (our youngest daughter) although studying in Bristol for her Masters in Social work, still makes time to come home and help as and when she can.

In the 3 months since opening we have been overwhelmed by the support of our staff and customers and really have not had time to really appreciate or take stock of all we have achieved so far, so thank you for all your understanding and assistance while we made the transition into the life of publicans. Although we do not intend to make drastic changes to the pub, we do intend to make some subtle improvements to enhance the

appearance and working environment. An initial step has been to introduce the Carvery on Sunday lunchtimes which has proved very successful throughout the Christmas period and we are looking forward to the launch of the new Spring menu, which has a variety of 'traditional pub grub dishes' using locally produced ingredients!

To coincide with the Snowdrop Valley excursions the Rest and Be Thankful Inn will be open all day for a variety of foods from the various menus, drinks and warmth during this seasonal event! (We will return to our normal hours of opening on the 1 March 2007)

## **CUTCOMBE PARISH COUNCIL**

Parish Council met on 16<sup>th</sup> January: minutes and draft minutes of all meetings are available on the website [www.wheddoncross.org.uk](http://www.wheddoncross.org.uk) and are posted on the Parish noticeboards at Wheddon Cross and Luckwell Bridge.

### **Snowdrop Valley Park and Ride**

At the meeting held on 10<sup>th</sup> January to discuss the future of the Snowdrop Valley Park and Ride there was a concensus of agreement that the local community will work closely with ENPA to find a way forward for future years. A Steering Group was appointed to discuss the issues involved with a view to monitoring the operation of the Scheme during 2007. A further open public meeting had been arranged for 8<sup>th</sup> February, 6.30 pm at the Moorland Hall, and it is hoped that as many people as possible will attend.

### **Parish Plan**

The Parish Council's initial application for funding for a Parish Plan was positively received by the Community Council for Somerset but more

details regarding project costs and budgeting have to be forwarded by the end of March. A public meeting has been arranged at the Moorland Hall for Monday 12<sup>th</sup> February at 6.30 pm and it is hoped that parishioners will attend to learn more about what is involved. Katy Calvert from the Community Council will be coming along to give a short presentation and answer questions.

## **Dog Fouling**

Problems with dog fouling have been interrupting football matches on the recreation ground. The Parish Council is working with the Moorland Hall Committee to try to improve signage and would like to remind everyone that there is a designated dog walking area on the opposite side of the field to the car park and to ask dog owners not to allow dogs onto the playing field. Everyone's co-operation in this matter would be greatly appreciated.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Tuesday 20<sup>th</sup> February 2007 at 7.30 pm in the Moorland Hall. The agenda will be available on the website and on the Parish Noticeboards in Wheddon Cross and Luckwell Bridge several days beforehand. Please remember that all parishioners are warmly welcomed at Parish Council meetings and time is set aside at the beginning of each meeting for public questions and statements.

## FOOD OF YESTERYEAR

### Lamb's Tail Pie

When I was younger on my dad's farm we always had lamb's tail pie. Mam used to put it in a pie dish and then put a crust on and cook it. She would then leave it until the next day and it would be set in jelly – delicious.

Wool was always a profitable commodity so the tails were plucked, then placed in hot water to clean off the wool that was left. Any remaining strands would be singed off. After several washings these lovely little white strips would be cut into 1" pieces and placed in a dish to which a little minced bacon and a pie crust put on and was then baked. When cold the pie would consist of lovely, thick delicious jelly.

At 86 years of age now, it makes my mouth water just to think about it. Oh, for the food of the old days.....

Where are the lovely giblet stews, hogs puddings, junket and cream and bitter greens?

Also we had woods on the farm and when the baby rooks hatched out the men would have a rook shoot. Then the legs and breasts would be boiled until tender with some parsley, a crust put on and left to set. Then put in the fridge. Another delicacy.

Also we used to make pigeon pie (legs, breast and parsley) also mam would cook them in a pudding basin with suet crust on top. Very tasty!

## **SNOWDROP VALLEY**

Supported by Exmoor National Park Authority and with kind permission from Badgworthy Land Company, the Snowdrop Valley Park and Ride scheme from Wheddon Cross will start on Saturday 3rd February 2007 and run until Sunday 25th February 2007 inclusive when the valley road, Draper's Way, will be closed to traffic.

The scheme, which has now been operating for eight years, helps prevent congestion along the valley road and makes it easier for local people to go about their business. The shuttle bus service will operate continuously from 10am to 5pm approximately every 20 minutes from the car park next to the Rest & Be Thankful Inn. The last bus back from the valley will be at 4.30pm. The fares will be £3 per adult; children under 15 can travel free. The price is for the round trip or part.

Well behaved dogs will be allowed on the bus at the driver's discretion. Visitors should wear appropriate clothing and footwear for winter walking. Disabled drivers and mini-bus drivers with passengers who are unable to use the buses should drive to Wheddon Cross to pick up a pass with instructions.

## **Refreshments**

As usual the Rest and Be Thankful will be open for meals etc with a new landlord, extended opening hours and a special 'Snowdrop Menu' – opening hours 10am-12pm - morning coffee, 12pm-3pm - lunches, 3pm-6pm - afternoon teas, 7pm-9pm - evening meals.

Exmoor House Tearooms will be open daily from 11am – 3pm with morning coffee, sandwiches, teas and cake etc.

The Moorland Hall will be manned by various organisations providing light refreshments, teas, coffees etc throughout February.

## **WEATHER EYE**



'Thunder in December  
Foretells fair weather'

December was mainly mild, wettish and grey and above all windy. Thunder and lightning accompanied the heavy squally showers during the

day the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> and there was hail at times. A bumble bee was seen on the eleagnus flowers on the 9<sup>th</sup>.

The 16<sup>th</sup> was a typically showery day, but was less grey with some sun and gave us lots of rainbows during the morning. By the 18<sup>th</sup> the wind had dropped and in its place came fog, morning and evening and all day at times too. There were 2 white frosts on the mornings of the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup>, (both recorded at -3°C air temperature) but these also brought some sun in the day.

‘If Christmas Day on a Monday be  
A great winter that year you’ll see’

Christmas itself was still calm but also grey and misty and by the 27<sup>th</sup> it was milder which brought rain and wind which continued until the end of the year.

Total rainfall for the month was 198.5mm (almost 8") falling on 24 days and there were 3 air frosts.

Total rainfall for 2006 was 1456.5mm (around 58") falling on 203 days. The wettest month was October – 240.5mm and for the first time this century April was the driest with 42.5mm. This was the only month which had less than 2" rain, but January/June/July/August all had under 3" and September was only just over 77.5mm. 2005 had 1253.5 mm. 39 air frosts were recorded in the whole year, the lowest being -5°C on the 10<sup>th</sup> February and 2<sup>nd</sup> March.
